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### **McCarty Center Announces Summer Day Camp Schedule**

Vicki Kuestersteffen, director of rehab services for the J. D. McCarty Center for children with developmental disabilities, has announced the McCarty Center's summer day camp schedule for 2006. There will be five-day camps scheduled for this summer.

The camp sessions will run from 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. at the McCarty Center. The camps are open to children entering the second grade through 8<sup>th</sup> grade. Lunch and snacks will be provided. The cost for the one-week day camp is \$100 per camper. Availability is limited to 24 campers per camp session. Computer camp is limited to 10 campers.

"The day camps will be themed based on the particular needs of the kids," said Kuestersteffen. "The camp directors will be our therapy department heads."

The first day camp session will be the Movin' & Groovin' Camp. It is scheduled for Monday through Friday, June 5 through June 9. The camp director will be Sue O'Hare, director of physical therapy.

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"This camp session is designed for kids who are able to participate actively in games and sports, with adaptation when necessary," explained O'Hare. Campers of varying ability levels will participate in a full range of indoor and outdoor activities designed to improve their fitness level, muscle strength and coordination. "The overall goal is to enable kids to enjoy gross motor fun," concluded O'Hare. For more information or camp registration contact Sue O'Hare at 405.307.2848.

Maria Greenfield, director of occupational therapy, will be the camp director for the second day camp session, the Sensory Integration Camp. This session is scheduled Monday through Friday, June 19 through June 23. "This camp session is designed for kids with a developmental age of five to 11 years old who are ambulatory, active and able to learn coping strategies for daily life," said Greenfield. This camp will focus on sensory integration. The campers will have the opportunity to experience a wide variety of sensory fun, including stimulation of vision, smell, sound, taste, movement and body awareness. The Social Skills Camp is scheduled for Monday through Friday, July 10 through July 14. Reni Hanley, director of speech-language pathology at the McCarty Center, will direct this camp. "This day camp is designed for kids who can communicate using speech or an augmentative and alternative communications device, with a developmental age of six to 12 years old, who is able to assist in developing a social story and do role playing," explained Hanley. Focusing on social skills, campers during this session will get the chance to learn and practice successful social interactions with peers in small and large groups. These activities will include initiating conversation, taking turns, social boundaries and courtesy. For more information or camp registration contact Reni Hanley at 405.307.2870.

There are two Computer Camp sessions scheduled under the direction of the McCarty Center's information technology administrator, Joel Mann. These sessions are July 24 through July 27 and July 31 through August 3. These four -day camps are Monday through Thursday. "The computer camp is designed for middle school kids with a developmental age of eight to 14 years old," said Mann. "This four day camp will focus on basic computer skills. Campers will learn word processing basics, how to use e-mail and the basics of website development," he added.

The McCarty Center will maintain each camper's website and e-mail address for one year so they can reach out to friends and family using computer technology.
